In preparation for this exciting event on Monday, all students in grades K-12 will be participating in special science lesson plans which are specifically designed to teach them about a solar eclipse. This engaging curriculum will explore the science behind the eclipse, its historical significance, and safe viewing practices.

We understand that this celestial event presents a unique opportunity for students and families to witness a breathtaking natural phenomenon and learn about the wonders of our universe. For families who wish to experience the eclipse together, we are offering the option for you to pick up your children early from school on April 8th beginning at 1:30 pm. Any time missed from school that day due to early dismissal for the eclipse will be considered an excused absence. Please be sure to follow our standard early dismissal procedures if you choose to do this.
