CELEBRATIONS

3rd Grade

Third graders visited the Long Island Explorium Children's Museum of Science and Engineering and were engaged in hands on activities applying scientific knowledge. Students utilized the mathematical idea of a quadrat, a standard method of measurement in archeology and ecology, to quantify findings in their "dig site" of sand or soil and buried artifacts. Students explored their site by carefully unearthing the artifacts, tracking the type and location of their evidence, and constructing a plausible story about what might have happened at the site.



4th Grade

Fourth graders classes attended a field trip to Connetquot State Park. Students participated in various hands-on activities that support our Science Curriculum. They had the opportunity to model sound waves using a slinky and cups. Conversations could be heard discussing the meaning of wavelength, amplitude, and frequency. Students shared how they feel, hear, or see sounds. They also observed that sound is

caused by vibrations and energy using a tuning fork and ping pong ball. Our future engineers built structures in jello using toothpicks and marshmallows. They experimented to determine if their structures are earthquake-proof by testing them in a "shaky" pan of Jell-O. They discovered that some building styles are morestable than others. After observing the outcomes, they had an opportunity to reinforce their structure and test it again. The culminating activity was a hike through the woods and a visit to the fish hatchery.



5th Grade

This vibrant bulletin board created by 5th graders celebrates Earth Day while spotlighting key environmental issues facing our planet today. Featuring eye-catching visuals, educational facts, and inspiring messages, it serves as a creative and informative reminder of the importance of sustainability, conservation, and collective action.

The thoughtful display encourages viewers to reflect, engage, and take steps toward a greener future. It showcases student-made posters highlighting critical environmental issues and creative solutions. From combating climate change and stopping overfishing, to reducing plastic pollution in our oceans, each poster reflects the students' passion and awareness for protecting the planet. It's a powerful display of young voices taking action and inspiring others to think globally and act locally.

6th Grade

On Earth Day, students had the opportunity to apply their classroom learning in a meaningful and engaging way. Drawing on their recent science lessons about alternative energy resources, they conducted research to deepen their understanding of how renewable energy can benefit the planet.

Students explored topics such as solar, wind, hydroelectric, and geothermal power, examining both the science behind these technologies and their real-world applications. Through independent projects, group discussions, and presentations, students connected their scientific knowledge to current environmental issues, fostering both curiosity and a sense of responsibility toward protecting the Earth.

kids starting in a new building. When they realized they were the older kids, the lions, in Dayton they decided to do something special for the incoming third graders, the mice. Each fifth grader recreated one second grader's drawing of a minion as a sculpted figurine. They then designed packaging and boxed the figurines to give to the 2nd graders as a welcome to Dayton Avenue School.

Spring is blooming in the library! Over the past few weeks, students have been diving into their books and taking time to reflect on what they've read. Each student has written a short summary of a book they've enjoyed, which is now displayed on a colorful raindrop or flower

as part of our hallway theme: "April Showers Bring May Flowers."

We use Chromebooks everyday.


Students need to bring them in fully charged.
